Abstract

The contrasting metaphysical perspectives of Rabindranath Tagore and Lalon Fakir, two iconic figures in Bengali spiritual thought. His philosophy aligns with Sufi and Bhakti traditions, focusing on the transient nature of the material world and the importance of self-purification for spiritual liberation. While Tagore's vision is universal and outward-looking, celebrating the divine in the world, Lalon's approach is inward and mystical, urging a transcendence of worldly attachments to achieve spiritual enlightenment. This study highlights their divergent yet complementary views on the divine, the material world, and the path to liberation.
